Site Volunteers Awarded Society Membership



It is now official, we are a family. Persons who have given at least 25 hours of volunteer service per calendar year at the Illinois Lewis and Clark State Historic Site are awarded an Individual membership of the Lewis and Clark Society of America the following year, with all the rights and privileges. The hours of service now count as dues. No monetary payment of dues is expected or required from qualifying individuals.

In recognition of the importance of volunteer service, the Board of Directors, under the authority of Article III Sections 3.1 and 3.3 of the Society's Bylaws, passed a motion at the August Board Meeting making volunteer hours as the requirement for an additional type of membership equal to all other types of membership. The new members are eligible to vote at General Membership Meetings, be elected to office and receive a 10% discount at the Store of Discovery.

If in 2012, you volunteered at the Lewis and Clark Historic Site at least 25 hours, you are a 2013 member of the Society. If you volunteer at least 25 hours in 2013, you are a 2014 member. The hours are based on the records kept by the Site's Volunteer Coordinator. We need your input, thoughts and participation to help make a visit to the Historic Site a pleasurable and memorable experience.

Lewis and Clark State Historic Site is hosting musicians with a tradition of period and bluegrass music for the eleventh year. Some of the musicians are in early American clothing. There will be music both inside the interpretive center and outside on the grounds. Local favorites, The Harmans, will be performing at 11:00 and noon in the theater.

Next door at the Lewis and Clark Confluence Tower, Confluence Lane, Hartford, IL there will be music in the morning by musicians Nancy Lippincott and Charlie Pool.

For the 7th year the Lewis & Clark State Historic Site will present “*Flags over the Mississippi: Struggle for an Empire.*” The theme of the event is centered on the European nations’ struggled to control the Mississippi River Valley and its natural resources. We are inviting re-enactors to represent European and American military units, and Native Americans between the time periods of 1750 to 1812. The event is on October 12 & 13, 2013, Saturday & Sunday, and will be open to the public from 10am to 4pm. Also, on the 12th there will be an evening of Cannon Fire between 6:00-7:00 pm.

Milicia de San Carlos: This is a re-enactment group of men, women, and children who portray the Spanish military personnel and local citizens of early St. Charles, Missouri. The military contingent represents the regulars of the Louisiana Regiment and the local militia. Both infantry and artillery are represented. Uniforms, civilian clothing, and equipment are authentic to the time period of the late 1700s. Weapons include reproduction muskets and rifles, and artillery pieces. Their presentation at Lewis & Clark site will include a brief historical background on the importance of the Spanish presence in 18th and early 19th century St. Louis area. In addition to their historical presentation Artillery pieces will be on display and fired.

The Detachment: William Clark and his men arrived at what would become Camp River Dubois on December 12, 1803. The location was very close to the confluence of the Missouri and Mississippi Rivers, the route chosen for the expedition. Most importantly, the location was in United States territory on the east side of the Mississippi River, which would honor the Spanish confirmation of the transfer of the Louisiana Territory to the United State. Construction of Camp River Dubois began immediately and by Christmas Eve 1803, the men were able to sleep indoors. While Clark oversaw the day-to-day operation of the camp, Meriwether Lewis was busy with official duties. In the spring the camp became a beehive of activities as final preparations were made. On April 1, 1804 Captain’s Lewis and Clark formally mustered into service the soldiers and other men who would take part in the expedition of the Louisiana Territory. Throughout the day “The Detachment” will be giving tours of Camp River Dubois and address visitor on the U.S. Army dress, weapons, and military life of a soldier.

2nd Regiment U.S. Artillery: Our newest addition to this year’s line up will include the 2nd Regiment U.S. Artillery which is dedicated to the reenactment of an early 19th century artillery battery. They fire a 3 lb Verbruggen which is an accurate and fully equipped reproduction of a Revolutionary War light 3-pounder cannon. These guns were left by the British after the War of Independence and then refitted and used by the Americans in the War of 1812. Their encampment will resemble a military camp in the 1812 War and they will answer questions concerning the conflict.

The First Royal Regiment of Foote: This is the oldest Regiment of Foote in the British Army. Often times it is referred to as “Pontius Pilate’s Body Guard.” From 1757-1763 the regiment fought in North America during the French and Indian War. In 1757 the 2nd Battalion of the 1st Foot saw action during the capture of Louisburg and in 1760 they capture Montreal. Re-enactors will drill, discuss their uniforms, and fire their cannons.

POW/MIA Flag and its Illinois Connection

Recently a visitor donated a POW/MIA Flag to the L & C site. The flag was adopted in support of our military personnel missing in action during the Vietnam War. On August 10, 1990 the U.S. 101 Congress passed public Law 101-355. This law recognized the National League of Families POW/MIA Flag designation. The flag was designed by William Graham Wilkin III. William had entered a contest and received 3rd place for his art work. He was a junior at Glenbard South High School. Glenbard is located in Glen Ellyn, Illinois. His original phrase accompanying his work stated, *"I believe they are alive,"* and the final statement of support reads, *"You Are Not Forgotten."* He has been recognized by the state of Illinois as creating the original art work which became the national flag to recognize the men and women missing in action in all U.S. conflicts. William is married to Jodi and has two daughters, Madalynne and Alexandra. At present he is a high school visual arts teacher at Aurora Christian School, Aurora, Illinois.

As an Army veteran, and the son of a Vietnam War veteran, and the son-in-law to an Air National Guard veteran (Berlin Airlift), and the nephew to a Korean War veteran, and a brother to an Air Force veteran, and an uncle to two members of the Illinois Air National Guard, and the cousin of Marine CPL William Early; who gave his life in the battle of Khe Sanh. I am proud to see our Nation's POW/MIA Flag flying at the Lewis & Clark State Historic Site. Our POW/MIA Flag will proudly fly each day except when our nation's flag is at half mast.



What Happen to the Expedition Keelboat?

Much has been speculated about the Keelboat once Corp. Warfington and his crew returned to St. Louis in the spring of 1805. In reading Donald Jackson's, *Letters of the L & C Expedition and Related Documents*, when I saw a letter from Pierre Chouteau to William H. Harrison! Jackson's footnote states, "Maj. James Bruff, military commandant at St. Louis, sent Warfington's barge (Keel Boat) to meet a part of the command of James Wilkinson, who was coming to assume the governorship of the Louisiana Territory. At least two of the soldiers who came down from Ft. Mandan were with the barge when it reached Wilkinson at Ft. Massac, and Wilkinson obtains from them some information which he sent to officials in Washington." (P. 243)

The next question is; what happen to the Keelboat after going to Ft. Massac???? Looks like more research, especially those footnotes!!!
